



**I**N PRESENTING this pamphlet to the public, it is our desire to inform it that we make a special business in hunting and taking care of hunting parties. We have regular established camps, which we describe later on, where we furnish parties with board, horses, competent guides, and everything one needs on a hunt except his rifle. All a hunter has to do when he comes to our camp is to kill the game when shown to him. We have a No. 1 cook, men to saddle and take care of horses, and good guides to show you plenty of game.

The foxhounds do the trailing, and "Boxer," the one that can run the coldest trail of any, has helped Goff to tree over one hundred lions and many bear and bob-cats. The other dogs do the fighting. We have some lion and bear chases at the fall camp. The best recommendation we can give the dogs is to say that at the great DeBeque hunt, they were put on a lion track at 5 P. M. one day, and an accident befel Mr. Goff so he could not follow them. The next day he sent a party out after them, and Wolcott found them at 1 o'clock with the lion up a tree. They never leave anything after treeing it.

### The Ranch.

We have a nice ranch twelve miles from Meeker, with a good house and cabins on it, where we board people and furnish them with saddle horses during the summer, and hunt from it with the dogs during the winter. There are quite a number of lion and bob cats near the

ranch in the winter, and anyone who wishes to live in a house and hunt will find this a splendid place from which to hunt. We have enough dogs now to split them into several packs, if desired.

### Spring Camp.

Our spring camp is pitched about ninety miles below Meeker. It is run on much the same order as the fall camp. It is rather a hard trip, but one is fully repaid for the trouble, as the bear are very plentiful. We go this far from Meeker in order to get to a place where there is little hunting and few people, for we believe it is better to take a day or two longer to get to camp, and then be sure to get what we are after, than stay near Meeker and not find bear.

The hunting at the Spring Camp is for bear and lion, exclusively; and both can be found here in the spring. The Camp is run from March 1 to June 1.



Condensed Colorado Game and Fish Laws, 1901-2.

**Trout** (none less than 8 inches) and other fish, with hook and line only, June 1 to Oct. 31.

**Deer and Antelope** with horns, Aug. 15 to Nov. 5.

**Elk** with horns, Oct. 25 to Nov. 5.

**Natural Evidence** of sex on Elk, Deer and Antelope must not be destroyed.

**Ducks and Other Water Fowl**, Sept. 1 to Apr. 15, except in altitudes over 7,000 feet, where open season begins Sept. 15.

**Grouse, Prairie Chickens, Wild Turkeys, Sage Chickens**, Aug. 15 to Oct. 31.

**Wild Pigeons and Doves**, July 15 to Sept. 30.

**Limit** for 1 day, 50 Ducks and 25 other birds, 20 lbs. of Trout and 50 lbs. of other fish. Limit for season, 1 each of Elk, Deer and Antelope, or instead, 1 Elk and either 2 Deer or 2 Antelope. Limit allowed in possession at one time, 100 Ducks and 50 other birds; 70 lbs. of fish.

**No Open Season** on Bison, Mountain Sheep, Beaver, Quail, Partridge, Mongolian Pheasant, Ptarmigan or insectivorous or song birds.

**No Close Season** or bounty on Bear, Mountain Lion, Lynx, Bobcat, Coyote or Fox.

**Prohibited**-Trapping or obtaining by any other method than gun or hook and line; shooting at game from public highway, or using steel or hard-pointed bullets; coursing game with dogs; killing by proxy; sale of game or fish taken at large.

**Possession** allowed for 5 days only after close of season, except as otherwise provided for private parks and lakes.

**Penalties**, fishing with explosives or killing buffalo, fine \$500 to \$1,000 or imprisonment 6 months to 2 years, or both. Other violations, fine \$10 to \$500 or imprisonment 10 days to 6 months, or both.

A WILD ANIMAL FARM.

Twenty miles from the town of Bozeman, Ida., is an establishment devoted entirely to the raising of wild animals. The stock is made up exclusively of the wildest, rarest and most ferocious creatures. This animal farm is owned and operated by Mr. Richard W. Rock, who has spent all his life in the West. As trader, hunter, scout and animal fancier he has been the hero of remarkable exploits. Thirty years ago he was a valued scout for Gens. Gibbon, Hayden and Howard. He is now the only man in the United States who raises wild animals on a large scale. Many of the big animals find their way from the ranch of "Rocky Mountain Dick," as he is called, to eastern zoological collections, and some of the rarer specimens have been sent to Europe. He has 52 buffalo, three grizzly bears, 60 elk and large numbers of moose, deer and Rocky mountain sheep and several black and brown bears. These animals are caught with a lasso when the snow is on the ground, secured and hauled to the ranch on sleds. There they have large quarters, but are securely confined. A few have been born in captivity. Mr. Rock has trained a moose to the harness, and it is a common sight to see him drive into Bozeman with his wife in their carriage drawn by "Nellie Bly."

On Wed 28 Aug, 1901, From Belly to So Fork Williams River in a side of about 35 miles, I saw considerably over 100 - about 150 deer, the vast majority does & fawns, nearly every doe had 2 fawns.

We went through one place that last year was good for 50 deer & saw but 4.

The decrease in game is at least 20 per cent.

passed 3 does at 20 feet, as they went away  
their ears lay back. The tail down  
my arm down turned  
I had now gone a mile & seen but few.  
I went over nothing. Saw a few  
gray rabbits in a glade. It was why my  
way - I heard a bay Jay called, so  
looked toward the Jay. I heard it more  
each time it looked my way, I say this  
as the Jay would attack the farm which  
I do not care enough to follow it around  
either - I followed it up & saw it again

and again I drove half a mile toward camp - Then I found a deer farm, but it was in red wat. As it was now late I made straight for camp - going mostly. Never I jumped. Ten deer, all does & fawns. They were 2's & ones, all were lying down in deep cover, the ground here a shoulder high - None of them deer made any sound except with the feet - and all wore a red coat except one doe - whose head was blue, probably a barren doe - All ran down hill, now wagged their tail but carried it straight down - None of the fawns were spotted. I fired one of the bows & one of the many traps - I found one or two snakes made possibly by the Indians. I saw but one bush.

This my 2 mile walk showed up 15 deer. The men in camp Chas Erickson & Lee said that 200 deer within a radius of one mile is a low estimate.

No old buck are notorious shy - being  
hunted so much for their horns.


Lee says this at Ikers Creek is a well  
known mountain buck that has been hunted  
for 5 years - & is he always keeps in the




 most five young ones, just the cutest - prettiest things I ever saw. They ran out when I first went in. The den was about 9 feet long 5 feet from the surface, nicely lined with grass etc. Both sides were running around, digging a ~~the~~ way Wolf den in sand hills Colo. <sup>is. of slender</sup>  
I found only 2. It was only 2 or 3 feet deep, a large hole. We killed the mother before digging, saw a mother & father. This was in June. They probably were just old enough to run a little.  
I dug out a coyote den <sup>same region as Wolf den</sup> 4 or 5' away. There were 3 or 4 feet deep, standing down  a good sized chamber lined with hair & their own fur.

We saw the mother at one hole - neither parent at the other. This was in June & that may have been the very first of July. The pups were big enough to run around all were raised by the members of the Bob S. They all <sup>all</sup> were born in June of great heats. This was 1897.

Wednesday 4 Sept - Pagoda Creek, Camp.

Lee Hamplman says that there are numerous wild bands of horses in Colorado especially on the desert. They cannot be caught because they take better brakes and leaders - where roping is impossible, they run them down and then turn about. They are worth and also ruin the animal.

Our band of broncos was herded for 6 years on the ~~snowy~~ Sleepycat Ridge. They would run the high ridge where the snow blew off. They do not fear the lions as they keep bristled. The lions attack only single animals, one with 7 or 8 head strayed down toward a large lake, but the snow got too deep - all died. The desert is N. W. Colorado on the Routt Co. on the Tetah line. It is also called Yampa Plateau - her antelope, Wolverine, Coyote, P. Dog, Lion, Bobcat, Potosi, Deer.

Park. This was told at the Womack Ranch - a young man

Mr Steely did not believe it so came up to satisfy himself

He counted 1100 Elk. They were thin in migration. They wintered down the river and now many

bands between White Bear River and northward



Small bands are still to be found  
in most part of the Forest Reserve  
and some winter along Sleepycat  
and in the lower broken along the  
South side. A few also winter on  
Lost Creek, in the lower broken -

Years ago Lost Creek was a famous  
place for Grizzly Bear as well as  
Elk. In 1888 a man named  
Solon Patterson was camped with me  
on lower Lost Creek. We were out of  
meat. He said he'd up & get a  
young Elk. Presently I heard a  
shot & supposed he had his Elk -  
<sup>after which</sup> I heard another shot. Pattern  
came tramping that night with the skin  
of a Big Selway. He had killed  
his Elk and was skinning
